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DAD IS COMING HOME FROM PRISON

It's been many years since dad left home for a prison to pay his debt to society. He left behind a comfortable large-size bed which he shared with his wife, and where his kids would come in and play hide and seek, for a thin used mattress that often produced severe backaches. Family dinners were replaced by sharing unidentifiable mystery meat at the chow hall with a hundred or so men who are complete strangers. Instead of reading stories to put his children to sleep, he would silently cry himself to sleep, avoiding others perceiving his weakness. Holidays, birthdays, graduation, and other special occasions were only a part of his imagination, not reality. After all, dad went to prison, not a resort.

That's all in the past now. Dad is finally coming home. He is a returning citizen who has no idea what to expect when he walks in through the door. He's welcomed home by familiar faces including family, friends, neighbors, and community people. However, everything he remembers has changed. His kids are grown up, his wife has become more independent, and even the neighborhood has changed. The cost of living has significantly increased, technology has advanced, and with no job or skills, dad feels frozen in time.

All of the above are real-life challenges that people face every day when they return home. It is incumbent upon society to initiate an honest conversation and programs geared towards having returning citizens better prepared to reintegrate into society. This would reduce the rate of recidivism while giving family's a better chance of success. The debt has been paid, it's time to move on.

DONATION OF HAND SANITIZING SUPPLIES & CLOTHING TO MDCPS



Silent Victims of Crime and the Inmate Literacy Foundation have been collaborating to donate much needed hand sanitizing supplies and clothing to Miami Dade County Public Schools. Over one hundred and ninety gallons of medical grade hand sanitizer and over five hundred dispensing stations were donated to the school system, allowing them to distribute supplies around the county and to approximately twenty four schools thus far. We look forward to continuing to work with Miami County Public Schools and with the Inmate Literacy Foundation to help our families and the students of Miami Dade.



One of the eldest children was accepted into a college in Georgia, and the family made the move up there to support her. They have been struggling to establish steady income and reached out to SVC to see if we could help with collecting warm clothing, electronics, bedding and other necessities. We successfully raised enough funds to help them get on their feet and help them through the colder months.

Our founder and executive director, Tinkerbell, says "We've never given up on this family, they've been with us for sevens years now and they've been homeless twice while they've been with us. After they moved up to Georgia, we knew we had to do whatever we could to keep assisting them. No matter what, we don't give up on our families and while they become independent we're always here if they need us".





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MY INTRO TO SVC

As a recent graduate of Florida International University, like many students, I initially was faced with figuring out what I wanted to do next. I decided to take a year off to experience life, volunteer, and work as I prepared to attend law school the following year. Upon looking for a position, I came across a job posting on Handshake for Silent Victims of Crime, which has been working with children of incarcerated parents for 26 years. I applied for the position but, unfortunately, another individual had already been hired. Nevertheless, that did not prevent me from still getting involved. I began to volunteer twice a week and grew to love the organization. Volunteering at SVC has opened my eyes to a key issue within our community regarding parental incarceration.

As of 2014, the National Resource Center on Children and Families of the Incarcerated has reported that nearly 1 in 28 children have an incarcerated parent. In total, that is nearly 2.7 million children nationwide who have fallen victim to the detrimental effects incarceration has on a household. Miami Dade alone has approximately 15,000 children who suffer from this ordeal. Studies have shown that children with incarcerated parents are six times more likely to go to prison opposed to those whose parents have not been convicted of a crime.

Parental incarceration has caused a strain on relationships and the mental well-being of children and their families nationwide. "Few studies have explored the impact of parental incarceration on young children or identified the needs that arise from such circumstances" (Travis et al., 2006) even though it continues to be a growing issue. Silent Victims of Crime caters to those who suffer from this life-changing ordeal and provides children of incarcerated parents with resources that range from emotional support, positive mentorship, impactful life skills and lessons through events, and an opportunity to build supportive lifelong relationships.

After experiencing a drastic change such as losing a parent, whether they may be deceased or incarcerated, children are not only faced with having to cope with their loss but are often challenged with now having to bear more responsibilities to assist their caregiver. Sometimes, children are even faced with the effects of being displayed and homelessness. "At least 9,000 students in Miami-Dade County alone are homeless or considered unstably housed" (Quintana, 2018). Silent Victims of Crime and the National Association for Children with Incarcerated Parents (NACIP) advocate for the best interest of the children and are working to ensure that upon initial arrest the needs of the children are adhered to. Advocacy has played a key role in facilitating the organization's key mission to assist children of inmates by enhancing their ability to improve their economy, providing educational and personal stability, and addressing behavioral, social, and mental challenges.

27th March 2022

GREEN ARCHITECTURE

The children loved this event! They were able to create their own cities, inventions or monuments using recycled materials. We had two architects, Roberta Feldman and Mayra Verdezoto, come to speak to the children about their jobs and about all the possibilities of work in the field of architecture. The children poured their creative energies into building their pieces, one group created a NASA gas station, while another created a homeless shelter and rehabilitation center. We had a birthday celebration as always, with gift cards, goodies, and balloons given out to all children with birthdays. There were extra prizes to go around, as well as a gift card for the team with the most creative architectural piece. Afterwards, the children had some free time outside where they played basketball and football with Wes. D.J. Dimelo 305 came out to join us and play some cool music for kids while they played.

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WRAPPING UP OUR SOUTH CAROLINA DUKE FOOD PROGRAM

We are sad to see our food program in South Carolina come to a close, knowing how much of a difference these groceries made to families. This six month program was supported by a grant funded by Duke Endowment, allowing us to provide weekly food deliveries to 24 families. We are currently looking for further grants to help support children in families with incarcerated family members and at creating other programs in South Carolina.

This program served a greater purpose than solely providing groceries to these families and getting much needed food on their tables. It also gave us the opportunity to form relationships with them and to be a contact in their support network. We connected with caregivers every week, getting to know their day to day lives, as well as their worries and their struggles concerning the children in their care and their daily experiences. While the program may be at its end, our connection to these families is not, which only makes us more dedicated to working towards what else we can do to strengthen these families and brighten their children's future outcomes.

SPOTLIGHT

WALLS TO BRIDGES

It is important to recognize the work that other organizations are making around the US. Walls to Bridges project sprung up during the pandemic in response to the frustrating lack of communication inmates had with their families during the pandemic due to closed visiting rooms policies. They are working to keep impacted families together by mailing children a book "from" their incarcerated family members. The project operates in California and is open to all incarcerated persons in California's jails and prisons. Currently, over 1,000 books have been sent out to children across the state.
