RAISING A FAMILY, ALONE.

They say it takes a village to raise a child. What happens when the main protector & provider is removed from that village? What happens to the caretaker that is now burdened with every facet of raising a family alone? Naturally, the vulnerability of the family increases exponentially as resources often become scarce and most likely tend to diminish with every passing day. Incarceration in the U.S. today is no longer a unique phenomenon, but instead a cruel and harsh reality for millions of families.

Although statistics reveal the truth, it does not put a face on the challenges faced by the hardships that are endured by the caretaker. The financial pressure of feeding and clothing a family for a single parent or caretaker is astounding. The emotional toll is equally devastating. Shame, guilt, and embarrassment are among the issues that caretakers are burdened with the association of incarceration. Whether it's Father's Day, Thanksgiving, or Christmas, the joy of the holiday is far from the norm when a parent is not around.

There are no words to properly illustrate the toll it takes on families when they are raised alone. Concerns about paying for rent, groceries and basics become a daily unknown. Feelings of helplessness and hopelessness tend to creep in silently. Children going to school tend to have poorer concentration with an increase in the drop-out rate. Caretakers are simply not equipped to handle all the burdens and stressors associated with raising a family without the main caretaker. While the criminal justice system implements its laws and guidelines on punishment, it must also consider the implications for families being raised alone.

At Silent Victims of Crime, our life's work is the dedication to the children and families of incarcerated parents.

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MARCH 30TH 2022

The children also made agua fresca, a refreshing drink using strawberries and watermelon with a "green mix". The children were so proud to share the food they made with everyone. The dessert they made was delicious – a Mexican churro cake. Towards the end, every child was given a backpack with notebooks and stationary, they were also given shakers so that they can make their own drinks at home.

Cooking is not to only create a delicious dish, but it has the power to create independence, creativity, and pass culture down through generations. We hope that enriching experiences like these encourage our kids to feel confident and exercise their creativity in the kitchen.

CONVICT KITCHEN

I wanted to shed some light on the team behind the food that feeds the children at all of our events. Convict Kitchen has been our main caterer for over a year now, providing food from every cuisine. It is run by a wife and husband duo who were both formerly incarcerated and released after serving seventeen years. They have been out of prison for almost two years now and were both released in July 2020. They have a son who joined SVC's programs in (INSERT YEAR) and is now in his early twenties. I had the opportunity to speak with Nicole and we discussed her time in prison, her family, and the origins of Convict Kitchen.

Nicole signed her family up with COI and SVC when they were running their prison visitation programs. Every three months, the organizations scheduled a trip for all the children and their families to travel together and spend a few hours with their parents in prison. Nicole spoke of how important these visits were for her and her son, they gave her time to connect with her son and spend time talking, hugging, and kissing him. It was through these visits that she also met Tinkerbell, who would later support her business once she was released from prison.

She spoke of how the pandemic had affected reintegrating back into society and the additional barriers that it put up in becoming an entrepreneur and getting her business up and running. Nevertheless, her heart was set on

establishing Convict Kitchen which has now been operating since September last year. She was determined to "walk the right walk" as she phrased it and earn an honest living doing something she enjoyed while making others happy. It was a decision that she came to during her time in prison. She told me how they would make food in the kitchens in the penitentiary and how she would make the prison food taste like "free world" food. It was one of the highest compliments you could get, having the skill to make food in prison taste as good as the food from the world outside. Cooking had always been her first love, and friends and other inmates would tell her, "this tastes just like free world food, oh my god, you need to do something with that talent".

I asked her how her son felt about her endeavors and she mentioned how proud he was of her and how proud she was in return. Her son has since graduated from high school, and is now working security while he takes college courses in Miami. Nicole said,


"My son tells me everyday, me and his father, I'm so proud of you all. And I know he is".

She spoke with such love in her voice, telling me about how her son asks her to cook for him and how even his friends request food too. It may seem ordinary to anyone else, but it was obvious how much she treasured the ability to have these moments with her son.

Nicole loves providing food for the children in our program. She loves children and knowing that they will be having a good meal and leaving with a full stomach. There is nothing she loves more than seeing children smile, be happy, and get excited about things, and it truly touches her heart to know that her food is reaching children who face difficult circumstances in their family. She said there was no hesitation when Tink called her about making the arrangement for Convict Kitchen to serve SVC's programs, and without hesitation, Nicole said "yes, let's do it". JUNE 8TH 2022
